Children can sign up for free at their local Middlesbrough library or online.

The Summer Reading Challenge:

- · Significantly improves reading confidence and independence
- · Ensures pupils are ready for their autumn return, preventing the summer reading 'dip'
- · Aids the successful transition between year groups and key stages
- · Contributes to all pupils' achievement and encourages extra-curricular activity
- · Develops links between your school, the library and the wider community

How it works:

- · Children can sign up at their local library, where they will receive a special sticker booklet
- · They set a summer reading goal and choose books, eBooks, or audiobooks of their choice logging their reading will earn rewards such as stickers and other small prizes.
- · Libraries will be running a programme of free themed events and activities too!
- · Children who complete the Challenge are presented with a certificate and a medal. You could organise a special assembly to present the certificates in the new term
